THE POWER of PRAYER

Ask any Christian, and I expect they will be able to tell you a time when God answered their prayer. Indeed it is sometimes said you should be careful what you pray for, because God has an incredible way of answering each and every prayer.

At Holy Trinity, in our Sunday sermons, we are currently looking at prayers people prayed that are recorded in God's word, the Bible. We are also considering this in our home groups.

Back in April, I was meeting with John Knight, a member of our congregation, and a retired vicar, to discuss what the next sermon series might be. That morning at home during my quiet time, (even though quiet time usually equates to a non stop list of things that have to be done racing through my mind), I was prompted to think we should do a series on prayers of people in the Bible. But like many thoughts these days it was long gone by the time I got to John's. I said to John "I really don't know what we should preach on in this coming season," and he said "why don't we do a series on prayers people prayed in the Bible"!

There is another power of prayer, and that is the power released when churches come together to pray. We saw this when we looked at Acts 4.

At church we have recently shared in 24 hours of prayer. People spoke of being encouraged, of an amazing time of worship

and of feeling the presence of God. I have noticed whenever we have 12 or 24 hours of prayer, God's presence and power seem more evident in the services that follow.

And there has been a slow gradual change in our times of Corporate prayer as well.

What is the change? If I sense we have moved slowly from coming together with a list of requests, and of course we still have them, to

much more praise. One manifestation of this is spontaneous singing, spontaneous praise.

- Praise glorifies God, exalts him and unites us.
- Praying together has the ability to unite us.
- And unity is worth striving for. It was after all a key theme in Jesus' prayer in John 17.



May God richly bless you with his presence now and always.
Amen.

I left you last time when I joined, or rather was persuaded to join the school Dramatic Society. I had used my singing voice whilst at Grammar School, being in the choir until my voice broke.

In the dramatic society I had small parts in two of Shakespeare's plays, Henry 1Vth part one and doubling up two parts in Macbeth. I also had a part in Westminster Hall, a short play written by one of our teachers as a fill in before The Importance of Being Earnest.



The lead of this latter play also played Macbeth and I had a scene with him playing a Scottish doctor. Pete had his back to the audience and made faces at me the whole time trying to get me to crack up. He lost.

My last year of school saw me playing in Treasure Island, but it never happened as on the morning of the first night, I awoke covered in spots. German Measles. The Germans may have lost the war, but they beat me in my thespian ambitions!

Anyway, after my recovery I decided to leave school and join my father in our butchery. I spent eight years at this, never making a butcher but learning enough about meat to know what to buy.

As soon as I reached seventeen, all I wanted to do was learn to drive, so I then started the procedure to obtain an artificial arm. For those who may not have noticed, my left arm is not as it was when I was born.

I got an absolute roasting from the doctor for not already having a limb as he said that I should have been fitted with one as soon as possible after my accident.

There ensued a difference of opinion between two doctors. Because my arm had got

fat, it had to be bound tightly in order to reduce the size before a cast could be made for the socket of the limb. "Pain" does not go anywhere near the word to describe what I suffered for this. However, I wanted to drive, so endure it I did.

As soon as I was able, I applied for a licence and got the necessary attachments, booked six lessons with the British School of Motoring and discovered how scared I really was.

Luckily, one of our employees was a driver in the Korean War driving tank transporters and he used to take me out in the shop van. He taught me more about driving than anyone, teaching me to double declutch, which I still do if driving a manual car.

I then took over the deliveries for the shop and did this for seven years until we sold up. My adventures had now started so I will sign off and see you next time.

SHORT TERM MISSION—LONG TERM EFFECT

Looking forward to the Olympics, we shall soon be seeing people representing their country in the various sporting events. Marie decided to serve the people of a country in a very different way. Here is her story, told in her own words.

“I have been fortunate to have had two opportunities of short term Christian work abroad over the past 18 years and both experiences were very different.

In 1984, I spent just under three months with Mary, a friend, working in Pakistan. In 2000, I went to India and Igatpuri India, for a month and half with Oasis India/UK.

Firstly I would like to share briefly about my Christian walk. From a young age I attended Sunday school. At the age of 13, at a youth event I asked Jesus to come into my heart and I was aware of the Holy Spirit moving deep within me; however it frightened me as the Holy Spirit had never been explained to me as a real experience. Over the next few years, I avoided attending events like this, however, when I reached 16, I decided it was time to publicly witness that I was taking my faith and God seriously, so I became confirmed in my local church. This was a huge step as I was saying to God, “Here is my life.”

At 18 I went to Spring Harvest, a Christian holiday event. This was an amazing experience, being with so many Christians and exploring my faith. It was during this time, that our church deacon and his wife were praying for my friend, the Holy Spirit moved powerfully on us. At that time that I was baptised with the Holy Spirit. They explained the Holy Spirit's work to me and that now God had called me to be a witness to him. From this point, I wanted to read more and more of what God is doing, learning from the Bible

and spending time in prayer. I had a new and fresh zeal for the Lord and the Christian faith.

The Lord gave me a conviction as a shy 21 year old, that he wanted me to go Pakistan.



On October 10th 1994, I boarded a plane to start a journey that has stayed with me over the last 18 years. When I arrived, other than the man I had travelled with I didn't know anyone.

This was where I met Mary and stayed with her during my visit. When I think back to my time there, I could see God's hand on my preparation before and during the experience.

I was involved in teaching English, helping in a Christian bookshop and visiting a leprosy colony. This had such an effect on me. For example, when a lady with leprosy gave me a hug and was overwhelmed that I would allow her a hug. But this is so close to what we read in the Bible. Given the opportunity I could talk and talk about my time there.

So many experiences and friendships were made; some of the people I met, I am still in contact with.

To anyone considering doing the same as me I would say there are for and againsts short term mission; however I feel you can give and receive during these experiences both home and abroad.”

Marie occasionally visits our church, when she is in this area. I am usually there, so, if you are interested in short term mission experience anywhere, speak to me about it. Or ring me on 01384562542.

Annie's little cheese and walnut biscuits

Makes 26 (108 calories per biscuit)

140 g / 5oz strong cheddar coarsely grated
 100g / 4oz unsalted butter, softened
 140 g / 5oz plain flour
 Pinch cayenne
 1 tsp. paprika
 1 tbsp. thyme leaves, chopped
 26 walnut halves from a 100g bag
 25g / 1 oz finely grated Parmesan

Heat oven to 180C / fan 160C / gas 4.

1. Beat the cheddar and butter together. Gradually sift in the flour, spices, thyme and a pinch of salt, then stir

together to a soft dough.

2. Shape the dough into bite-size balls, then push a walnut half into the centre of each one. Close the pastry around the walnut halves. Put onto a baking sheet, sprinkle with Parmesan, then chill for 30 minutes until firm (can be frozen uncooked for up to a month)
3. Bake for 12-15 minutes until golden brown. Nice served warm, but just as good cold.

A TRIBUTE TO MOM (Dorothy)

It is rare nowadays for someone to live in the same place all their lives, but Old Hill is where our mom was born and lived for the past 95 years. Daughter of Laura and Charles Wyatt she was born on 23rd January 1917 and it was ten years later that brother Derrick came along.

Heavy industry and chain making was a signature of this area and Charles made his living as a stamper, whilst Laura went into retail and opened a fish and chip shop in Lawrence Lane.

Dorothy regularly helped her mom with the preparation, fish frying and cleaning up and it was whilst taking an evening off from the chores that she met Jack Spittle at the local fair.

They started courting and each evening Jack came from Gorsty Hill on his bike to see her, and although he was nearly always late it didn't matter as love flourished and lasted all the 66 years they were together.

They were married in 1939 and Jack was determined that his new bride would have the best start. As a plumber he worked nights and weekends to buy and furnish their first house.

As part of the war effort Jack did his national service in Cairo in Egypt and on his return he set up his own business in plumbing and heating. Daughter Christine was born in 1942 and son Alan completed the family on the 26th June 1949.

1953 saw the family move to 363 Halesowen Road to take over a grocery shop which was run by Dorothy for ten years, but with the emergence of supermarkets this became unprofitable.

Dorothy then continued in food retail and worked for George Mason's shop in Old Hill, before completing her working life as a school dinner lady.

With the marriage of both her children, then came the joy of grandchildren and more recently great grandchildren and she has never been found wanting when we needed her help.

Wherever she worked or whoever she came into contact with mom has planted seeds of love and goodwill and during the latter part of her life she has reaped the fruit of this harvest in all the friends who have kept in touch and cared for her.

Her generosity is renowned especially with children. For many of us it was a regular occurrence to receive flowers and a very thoughtful card or gift to express her love or concern whatever the situation. The holding cross was her favourite gift and many of you I know, have one.

Daughter Christine and family moved to Torquay which resulted in regular holidays to the South West and over the years she amassed a whole group of new friends who looked forward to seeing her each year.

Although we were left in no doubt of Mom's firm faith and love of God, it was left to us all to make our own decisions and her way of teaching was by example with many years of worshipping at Holy Trinity and also St James.

As her family, we have had the greatest privilege to experience her love and caring at first hand and she has left a space that simply no-one can fill.

The last few weeks were the most painful for her and for us all, but she always managed to give us 'that smile'.

We trust that mom is now at peace and that Jack has finally picked her up in the van and taken her home.

His love is eternal


